Leaders

WIL GAFNEY

The Rev. Wil Gafney, Ph.D., is associate professor of Hebrew Bible at Brite Divinity School in Fort Worth. An Episcopal priest and former Army chaplain, she is the author of *Womanist Midrash: A Reintroduction to Women of the Torah and of the Throne* and a Wisdom Commentary, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah. She also is co-editor of The Peoples' Bible and The Peoples' Companion to the Bible.

She earned her Ph.D. in Hebrew Bible from Duke University, her Master of Divinity degree from Howard University School of Divinity and her bachelor's degree from Earlham College.

Dr. Gafney's sermons have been published in the books Those Preaching Women: A Multicultural Collection and The Audacity of Faith: Christian Leaders Reflect on the Election of Barack Obama.

She remains a member of the historic African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas in Philadelphia, as she is canonically resident in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania. Founded in 1792, it



is the first Episcopal church in the U.S. founded by and for African-Americans. She is a former member of the Dorshei Derekh Reconstructionist Minyan of the Germantown Jewish Centre in Philadelphia. She remains actively engaged in interreligious work and is particularly interested in how Jews and Christians interpret the texts they hold in common. She is also licensed in the Diocese of Fort Worth.

VALERIE BRIDGEMAN

Dr. Valerie Bridgeman is interim academic dean and associate professor of homiletics and Hebrew Bible at MTSO. A preacher and speaker in high demand throughout the country, she is the founding president of WomanPreach!, an organization bringing preachers to full prophetic voice. Ordained in the Church of God (Anderson, Indiana), she holds a doctorate from Baylor University, a Master of Divinity degree from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary and a B.A. from Trinity University.

ELAINE NOGUEIRA-GODSEY

Dr. Elaine Nogueira-Godsey is associate professor of theology, ecology and race at MTSO. She brings a global perspective to her teaching and scholarly research. A native of Brazil, where she received her bachelor's degree, she earned her master's and Ph.D. from the University of Cape Town in South Africa. Dr. Nogueira-Godsey has written extensively on the intersection of ecology, race, gender and theology. The GlobalChurch Project recently named her one of "18 Latin American female theologians you should know about."

TEJAI BEULAH

Tejai Beulah, coordinator of partnerships and the Black Church and African Diaspora Studies specialization at MTSO, is a Ph.D. candidate in American religious history at Drew University. Her dissertation examines the theological writings of black evangelical preachers and activists in the Black Power era. She earned a Master of Theological Studies degree from MTSO; a master's degree in African American and African studies from Ohio State University; and a bachelor's degree in English, history, and gender diversity studies from Xavier University.
