Elaine Nogueira-Godsey brings a global perspective to her teaching and scholarly research. A native of Brazil, she received her bachelor's degree from Faculdade Teológica D'Oeste do Brasil. She earned her master's and Ph.D. from the University of Cape Town in South Africa. She has written extensively on the intersection of ecology, race, gender and theology. In 2017, the GlobalChurch Project named Dr. Nogueira-Godsey one of "18 Latin American female theologians you should know about."

Kelsey Ryan-Simkins, who earned a Master of Arts in Practical Theology degree from MTSO, is pursuing her Ph.D. in the School of Environment and Natural Resources at Ohio State University. She has been involved with several applied projects that aim to implement equitable food system transformation through the establishment of food hubs in marginalized Columbus neighborhoods.
